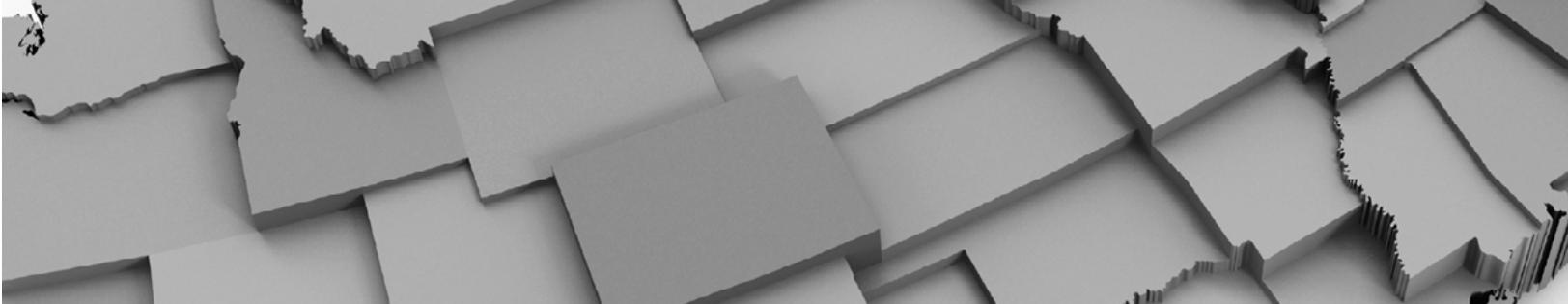

- **The American Public Human Services Association (APHSA) offered a webinar in November, *Leading Change: Ramping-Up Your State's SNAP Employment & Training Program*.** The webinar featured FNS' Office of Employment and Training presenting on multiple efforts underway to expand quality SNAP E&T programs across the country, as well as presenters from Wyoming (the State's SNAP agency as well as one of its SNAP E&T third-party partners, Climb Wyoming) discussing the development of Wyoming's SNAP E&T program.

- **The Working Poor Families Project released a new brief, *Improving Job Quality for the Early Childhood Workforce*.** The brief discusses the current labor market status of Introduction Early Care and Education (ECE) professionals (childcare workers) and strategies to improve the quality of their jobs. According to the report, nearly half of these workers enroll in some form of public assistance, including SNAP, due to their low earnings.

- **A new brief published by the Center for Law and Social Policy (CLASP), *Incarceration to Reentry: Education and Training Pathways in Indiana*,** highlights how the State of Indiana is working to align education and training opportunities for its incarcerated population. The State is demonstrating strong initial success with its Second Chance Pell sites in increasing literacy, GED and career technical education (CTE) program completion rates among this population.

Launched in October of 2015, *SNAP to Skills* (S2S) is a project of USDA's Food and Nutrition Service (FNS), operated in partnership with Seattle Jobs Initiative (SJI), to provide States the tools and resources they need to develop job-driven SNAP E&T programs that help SNAP participants find jobs and work toward self-sufficiency. The project seeks to help advance SNAP E&T programs in all States through these tools and resources, while 10 States have been selected to receive enhanced technical assistance.
